

Discover Your Strengths and Create a Strengths-based Organization

Heard of the strengths revolution? It's the idea that you, your team, and your company, will get farther faster when you focus on what you do well vs. what you don't. In individual coaching, team meetings, half-day or full-day session, leaders and teams learn about individual and group strengths while having fun at the same time. This is an excellent and practical team-building experience. And, for leaders, when you identify your team's talents and build them into strengths, it is easier to become a high-performing team.

Before the workshop, participants read the first 40 pages of the book StrengthsFinder® 2.0, based on Gallup's research and results on employee engagement. Participants then complete a 20-minute online assessment and send their reports to the facilitator, who reviews and customizes the material. The individual assessment reports provide participants with detailed information on their top five strengths and how they can continue to build upon them. Also, the opportunity for teams to discover the rank order of all 34 strengths of participants can be included. With the information, teams are able to identify and plan for "holes" in their game plans such as staffing, project implementation, and communications.

How To Create A CAPE (Coalition to Achieve a Positive Environment) in Your School

Getting Started With Google Docs For School Administrators

Google Docs is a FREE online word processor, which allows you to collaborate in "real time," or asynchronously. Extend your professional community online and make your job easier and more efficient. Organize a paperless workflow for administrative tasks, as you design documents to use with staff, parents, students, and other administrators that can be accessed from any computer/mobile device, anytime, anywhere. Add links to web-based resources, insert images, use the research tool. Upload existing documents you've already created. Also see ways your teachers and students can use Docs.

Now more than ever, it is essential that our school leaders be provided with high-quality support as they tackle the difficult, challenging, and rewarding work of educating our children. SAANYS, in collaboration with the Ontario Principals Center, is pleased to offer districts the training their administrators need to become more proficient as a MentorCoach. Whether part of a district team seeking to build an in-house mentorcoach program or as an individual wanting to become an effective mentorcoach, this workshop is designed to fill a gap that has existed for too long – the limited opportunity to grow professionally from a mentoring/coaching relationship. The skills and principles

of coaching are focused on taking an individual from where they are to where they want to be. It is a tool for building individual and team capacity and developing competency and self awareness.

Creating Positive Classrooms and Schools: At the "CORE" of Teaching and Learning

Data Handbook

Norton's Data Handbook was created for the administrative team at NSCSD. It was so well received that she was asked to present on it at the local BOCES and at the statewide DATAG meetings. She has run data teams here at North Syracuse for the past seven years and used this tool to construct meeting protocols and focus discussions. She has found it to be closely aligned to the data driven instruction model proposed by Bambrick-Santoyo at network team meetings, allowing data teams here to disaggregate benchmark and summative assessments, as well as other relevant data not related to testing.

How to Build a Better Test

This workshop is based on the frustrations heard from teachers within the presenter's district and around the state. Teachers explained that they had very little training in creating test questions and were unsure if the exams they were developing (especially for SLOs) were valid. Norton has conducted this workshop within the North Syracuse Central School District, at local BOCES, at a statewide DATAG meeting. She became very interested in the topic when she was asked to teach an Assessment and Accountability Course at LeMoyne College. In the course of this research, she found it possible to distill the pertinent information into a workshop format that has an interactive component and some very interesting actual examples of poorly developed test questions.

Assessment Development - Refining SLOs

What Does Common Core Instruction Look Like and Sound Like in Real Classrooms: Identifying the Strategies That Make It Work

The goal of this workshop is to simplify and demystify the hallmarks of instructional strategies for deeper learning by identifying practices that are essential to new modes of learning. Through the use of video examples of real classrooms at the elementary, middle, and high school levels, participants will be able to identify common core instructional strategies using the NYSED CCLS Instructional Evidence Guides and then connect the practices to domains and components in their own district evaluation rubrics. Participants will be able to use this format as an ongoing professional development activity with faculty over the course of the next school year.

Effective Feedback Around Instruction

The focus of this workshop is on the post observation conference. Using video examples participants will practice with protocols that provide a step-by-step process that integrates effective praise, targeted questions, identification of areas for growth, exploration of solutions, and confirmation of next steps. Discerning high inference from low inference feedback, and providing actionable steps with accountability will be addressed. Strategies for difficult conversations and coaching competencies will also be explored.

We Can't Do This Alone: Building A Collaborative Culture to Support Change Presenter: Karen Bronson

Collaboration is more than a buzz word. It is the single most important factor to raise student achievement and manage the demands in a time of rapid change in our schools. This workshop identifies actions you and your colleagues can take to work together differently to build a culture that supports and promotes a collaborative culture in your school or department. By adopting practices that are truly collaborative in nature and rethinking the use of time at existing meetings, silos are dismantled and the foundation for true change is built. Participants will take away tools and how-to's of collaborative practices such as unpacking standards, looking at data together, developing common assessments, and using student work as a primary data source to provide focus and tools going forward.

Academic Vocabulary Crucial to the Core

Instructional strategies to use in the classroom at the elementary, middle, and high school levels will be shared and practiced in this informative and practical workshop.

Making Data Matter: Protocols and Practices that Work

We've gathered a whole bunch of data, and now what do we do with it? How do we make the all-important leap from gathering, to interpreting, to actually using data to make a difference in classroom instruction? How can we revamp existing meetings (faculty, department, team, IST) to focus on data in a meaningful way? This interactive workshop will focus on strategies for leaders to use to create the conditions to engage teachers in an ongoing exploration and use of data. We will focus on student work and local assessments as a primary form of data and identify practical and realistic strategies that do not require additional resources to implement. Protocols for facilitating effective data meetings will be shared and explored and participants will practice with actual data sets.


